

Message from the head: We had the briefest spell of sunny weather earlier in the week and started to dream that summer was upon us! The children made the most of it with various outdoor trips as well as utilising the outdoor areas we are so lucky to have here on site. I wanted to share some wonderful news with you about our outdoor spaces and the fabulous children who make up the school's Rights Respecting School Ambassadors. Before the Easter break they had been working on a project focused on making improvements to the pond area at the front of the school. They decided they want to be able to develop the area - cleaning out the pond, improving the planting around it and thinking about how, as a school, we can make better use of it. The put together a bid to the Camden Green Dragon scheme and made a video about what they wanted to do. Their bid was considered and I am delighted that their hard work has paid off with their idea being agreed as worthwhile by the 'Camden Green Dragons' and they have been awarded a grant of £500 to cover the costs of their project. We have since cleaned out the pond and the Ambassadors are ready to start planning to spend the money and make the changes they want watch this space! So I'd like to say a huge thankyou to all of them—Zara, Robyn, Fatma, Layan, Okpe, Mia, Jarod, Ursula, Hana, Tyrell, Sufiyan, Millie and Riga. On Monday this week we had a visit from Andy George, he is our 'Professional Partner' from Camden Learning and visits us at least termly. During his visit we spent some time in classes as well as looking at children's books and the progress they have made. Andy also met with some children from across KS2 and discussed all the things we do here at Fleet. What really came across during his visit was the high quality learning opportunities the children receive and this could be clearly seen in terms of the progress evident in the books from September to now. From his discussions with the children too, the richness of the curriculum really came across, especially around trips and other opportunities teachers include within their topics. I know from discussions with many of you, and certainly from feedback when I do parent tours for prospective families/children, these opportunities are really valued. Including so many trips and visitors does come with a significant financial cost. I will be sending out a letter next week to remind you all about class teas (which start again with Reception on 16th May)—these are one of the main ways we help to raise additional money for trips. Please look out for the letter via ParentHub—if you aren't on PaerntHub see information below and get signed up as soon as possible. It's another way we are able to save money so there is more available for trips and resources. Have a great long weekend.
