**un-** to the beginning of it?

When we add un- to the beginning of a word, we change its meaning to the opposite. Cool language trick, isn't it?

Look at the example below. My word is **happy**. To change it to mean the opposite, I add un- to the beginning of the word, so it becomes unhappy.

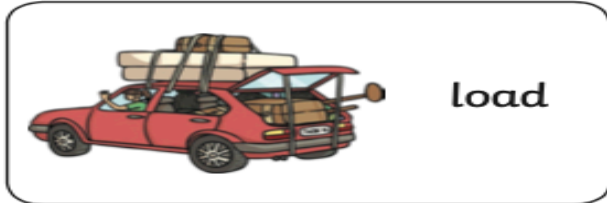
