• Which was your favourite illustration?


# Can you put these events from the story in order?

*Jemmy Button arrives in the city after a long journey on a boat.* 


Jemmy Button thinks about whether he belongs in the city.





Jemmy Button looks at the stars, wondering what it would be like to leave his island.

> Jemmy Button goes back home and shows his family his new possessions.



<u>Task 1</u> - write a diary entry in role as Jemmy describing your favourite part of the story

- Think about the story. Which part of it did you like best?
- Write a recount of what happened during this part, from Jemmy Button's perspective.
- <u>Success criteria:</u>
- It'll be a diary entry so you'll need to use first person (I, my) and past tense.
- We'd also like you to use fronted adverbials (we'll remind you how to do this on the next slides) and 'show not tell' to describe Jemmy's feelings and emotions.

#### Feelings – show not tell


- 'Show not tell' is where we try to describe someone's feelings in an interesting way, to show our reader how someone felt.
- So an example would be: instead of 'he was angry', you might say 'shaking with rage' or 'fists clenched and teeth gritted'.
- More examples: can you match the emotion that might go with these? *Hands shaking,*

Tears were rolling down my cheeks.

Rolling my eyes,

A sudden beaming smile lit up my face.

A cold sweat trickled down my back.



#### Fronted adverbials

- Remember, fronted adverbials give us information about how, when or where something happened. They go at the start of a sentence and have a comma after them.
- Revise fronted adverbials here and have a practice using them: <u>https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/articles/z7v4kmn</u>
- Some examples of fronted adverbials for how, when and where: <u>Nervously</u>, I cambered off the boat and onto the shore.

<u>After a few minutes</u>, I was completely surrounded by finely dressed people.

Inside the auditorium, I could hear the most beautiful music.
