
# Year 5 Art Week beginning 18<sup>th</sup> May

L.O.: I can understand the features of Cubism and create a piece of art inspired by this art style.

This week we're looking at the art style 'Cubism'. What do you think it's features are?

The Cubism movement was developed by **Pablo Picasso** (on the left) and **George Braque** (right) in **France** around **1907**.





#### Abstract art

Picasso and Braque began painting figures and objects in an **abstract** (unrealistic) form. They broke down the features of the subject (what they were painting) and reassembled them in a different way.

Their paintings were made up of cubes, spheres, cylinders, cones, and other geometric shapes. The paintings looked like someone had cut them up and glued them back together!

## Perspective

Perspective is the technique used to represent a 3D world on a 2D surface in a way that looks realistic and accurate, just as we see it in nature.

**Cubists** wanted to show the **most important parts** of the things they painted, not just the realistic perspective of what is actually seen.

You would never be able to see all sides of a person's face at the same time. Cubists however wanted to show all the sides of an object in the same picture.

They abandoned perspective!

No perspective... or all perspectives?! You can see all the angles of the women's faces.









At first, cubists used very little colour in their paintings. They used mostly browns, greys, and blues.



In 1912, colour re-entered the picture (literally) and some artists, like Picasso, began using lots of bright colours along with dark lines to outline features.

There are 2 tasks to choose from, but of course, you can do both if you like!


#### Option 1.

Or, try the style on the right. Use a ruler and black pen to draw lines in different directions on a piece of paper to make between 5 and 10 different sections.

In each section, draw a different body part e.g. eye, ear, nose, mouth, hair, hand.
