# But what is a biography? And what are the features of a biography?

A biography is an account of someone's life, written by someone else. Your reading task this week involves the <u>biography</u> of writer, Benjamin Zephaniah.

#### **Features:**

Written in **past tense** – was, did, paint<u>ed</u> Written in **third person** – she, they, her, their, herself **Facts** about that person presented in **interesting, full sentences** – it is not just a list of facts! Devices to **link sentences** and ideas - conjunctions, adverbials.

Our challenge: to use **parentheses** to include some extra information!!

Parentheses We have looked at using parentheses before... what can you remember?

## This might help...

### Parentheses

- **Brackets**, **dashes** and **commas** indicate parentheses (parentheses is the plural of parenthesis).
  - Parenthesis is a word or clause **inserted into a text as extra information** or as an afterthought.
  - A pair of brackets, commas or dashes is used **to enclose the extra information** or afterthought.
- Brackets always come in pairs, but if you are adding the parenthesis at the end of a sentence, you don't need to put the second comma or dash.
- Sometimes parenthesis isn't within another sentence it is a sentence on its own. (You would use brackets to how this, not commas or dashes).

# 'The lion ate his dinner.' Let's add some more information!

Commas: The lion, who has sharp teeth, ate his dinner. Brackets: The lion (with a fluffy mane) ate his dinner. Dashes: The lion - who wasn't very cool - ate his dinner. Can you think of another?

Look back at your Frida facts. Can you put one or two of them into a sentence and add parenthesis?

Using the plan we wrote, write your biography about Frida Kahlo.

- Use the sub-headings from page 4 to structure your piece.
- Remind yourself of how a biography is written by doing this week's reading task first.
  - Look back at the features on page 6 of this resource to help you too.
  - Try to use parentheses! However, don't use them too often! Once per paragraph is probably enough and definitely not more than twice.
  - Don't forget Year 5 non-negotiables capital letters, punctuation, paragraphs, correct spellings, conjunctions...
