This year's theme...Lifting Limits!



Benjamin Zephaniah



Benjamin Zephaniah was born in 1958 April 15th, Handsworth Birmingham, England. He's originally from Jamaica and his birth sign is Aries. He's also known for being a writer, author and poet.

He started to like poems and wanted to write some too. After a while he got inspired by Bob Marley. Unfortunately, he was dyslexic and messed around with his friends in school until he had to drop out, at the age of 14. Soon, he gained fans from his neighbourhood at 15 years old and determined to become a poet.

In his poems he uses a lot of spelling to connect to his Jamaican tone. He published his first poem in 1983 called 'pen rhythm' and his poetry is called dub poetry. Benjamin is part of the vegan society and that's why he wrote a poem called talking turkeys. Also, did you know city river blues was inspired from reggae? During an interview he once said "The planet is for everyone boilders are for no one it's all about freedom."

Benjamin faced a lot of racism but he still stands for refugees, and wants everyone to be treated with respect. Soon he started writing poems for TV's, plays, radios and stages. After a while he overcame dyslexia which is amazing. The Queen herself sent him a request but he publicly declined it. In 1990 he married a woman but got divorced 11 years later and unfortunately, she died in 2001. Also, did you know the book he wrote called Refugee Boy, which was published in 2001, was linked to the quote about how everyone should have a right to freedom no matter what.

Benjamin Zephaniah is an inspirational figure because he stands up for so many wonderful things like racism, social equality and refugees. And some people could become inspired by him for another reason because he was dyslexic but still reached and achieved his goals.

MALORIE BLACKMAN

Malorie Blackman is a very successful children's and adults' author. She has won many awards and has done great things. Her earlier life is full of racism and the fact that she ignored that and carried on to then become famous, is amazing.

Born in London 1962, her first ambition was to become an English teacher, but that idea was abandoned later when she got into computer science. At 13, her parents separated, making her life more difficult than ever.

When she was 28, her first book called "Not so stupid!" was out in 1990. Then in 1992 her first novel was released. And, in 2001, a book called Noughts and Crosses started making money.

In 2008, Malorie was awarded an OBE, and then became the new children's laureate. As well as that, earlier this year she won the PEN PRIZE.

This author is still winning awards to this day, and no one can deny that that is impressive. In her free time she likes to play video games, piano, composing and more. Malorie Blackman is very inspiring (books and self) because even though her past was dark, she thinks her future is bright.




