On Monday this week I had the pleasure to attend the bi-annual Camden Music Festival at the Royal Albert Hall. This year we were selected to not just send singers, but to work on a Carribean inspired music project with our Year 5 (and some Year 6) brass instrumentalists. This has been a wonderful experience for the children working with the wonderful Kinetika Bloco since September developing the original piece of music performed on the night. Not only has their brass playing improved but from the discussions I've had with the children since Monday and a number of their parents, it's clear their passion for music and performance has too. To be on stage and perform at one of not just London's, but the World's iconic venues is something that will stay with them for a very long time. They were fantastic. We will have to wait a couple of years for the next one but I'm already looking forward to it! There are so many opportunities for music at Fleet from the whole class instrument lessons in years 3, 4 and 5 to the wonderful individual lessons offered through Camden Music Service (see info in the Wednesday Community Notices Newsletter for more information), not to mention singing in our shows, class assemblies and weekly singing assemblies.

Next Thursday is another day of strike action planned by the NEU due to their dispute with the DfE and government over funded teacher pay rises. Due to this industrial action we will be closed next Thursday, 27th April, to all pupils except Year 6. While this week every class was above 90% we have seen a dip in most year groups. No class made the evarly target level of 96% with Year 6 coming closest with 94.7%. Year 3 and Reception very close to them both with over 94%. Thank you to all those families who continue to bring their children in to school and reduce the time they miss. Resilience is a key quality that we want to encourage in all our young people so please do avoid keeping off for minor ailments—better to send in a see if they improve which they often do as they go through the day. For the year we are currently at 92.7% which we know we can improve.





will be included in the final calendar if their image is selected.








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

Intelligent child, those men, those thieving men, gleefully driving the boat.


Above you,
