Punctuality Award Lates have crept up this week, increasing to 31, compared to 22 last week and 24 the week before that. Thanks to the vast majority of

you who arrive everyday on time—we have been really impressed by the positive start to this year, however—we need to ensure that we keep up good punctuality. Well done to Year 2 and Year 4—our winners with 3 lates each. Good effort. Year 6 in second place with 4 lates, Year 3 and Reception tied in third place with 5 each leaving Year 1 with 9 lates. Attendance Award Attendance has dropped this week, down from 96% to 93%, which means we are below our target of 96% again. All year groups were below 96% (with the exception of Year 5 who are on school journey). Winners this week were Year 5 with 100%, followed by Year 1 (94.3%), Year 3 (93.7%), Year 6 (93%), Year 4 (92.2%), Year 2 (90.8%) and Reception (88.2%). We need to work hard to bring our attendance back up after the half term break, as good attendance will ensure children maximise their learning potential. Please remember, you should not book holidays during term time. Time off during term time will be unauthorised and you may receive a fine from the local authority.










































































# SEIGE OF BAGHDAD

Last night, the Mongols struck an attack on Baghdad, Iraq after being declined the power of the Islamic Empire. The fall of Baghdad has arrived

In December 1257 Hulagu Khan, leader of the Mongols, had sent Caliph Musta'sim, caliph fleader of the Round City, messages, urging his surrender. Musta'sim retused, and Khan started to prepare for war, unknown to the Caliph, He gave Musta'sim a last visit under a flag of truce but still Musta'sim determinedly declined.

#### At January 1258 Bulagu Khan striked.

was chaos. The moment the Mongolians murdered Caliph Al-Musta'sim and his family, every citizen of Baghdad panicked. What would they do without a king, a leader? The famous douse of Wisdom was demolished and all the important noble books were thrown in the River Tigris, making it run black with ink, cursed to be removed of all knowledge and power. Women were forced to be betrothed to soldiers and raped. The Mongolians used sleep engines and used cataputs to launch spears and weapons at the city.
